

JAPANESE URBAN AREA TARGET DAMAGE

See Section 9-2. Table 9-1 may direct that one or two boxes be crossed for the target city on U/A missions (Table 2-2C, 2-3) against that city. Once all boxes are crossed off for a particular city, that city is considered “bombed out” and no more U/A missions will be flown against it (*non-U/A* missions may continue). If a “bombed out” city is rolled for on Table 2-2C, then roll instead for a target on Table 2-3. For the smaller cities on Tables 1 and 2 below (from Table 2-3) cross off each after one “on-target” U/A mission against it (remember to cross the city off on *both* Tables if it’s carried on both—such cities are in bold type below for easy cross-reference)

*Note: the major city boxes below are **not** meant to be an accurate comparison of city size (Tokyo, for example, was clearly Japan’s largest city in 1945 as it is today); rather each box represents a discrete urban area identified and designated by the US Joint Target Group in early 1945 as worthy of inclusion in a comprehensive plan of area attacks.*
